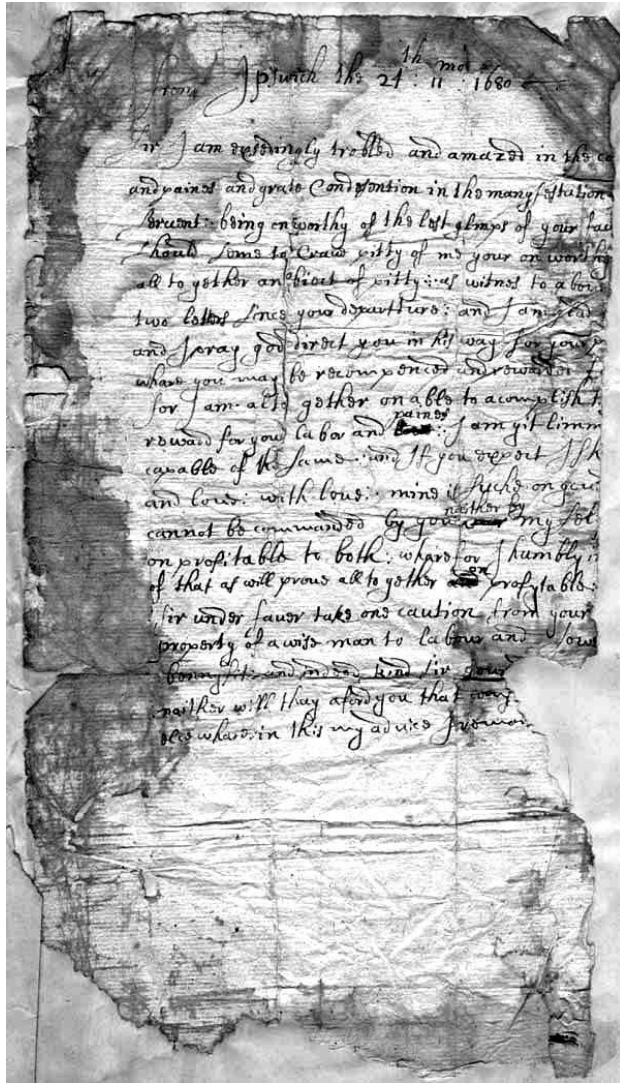

from Ipswich the 24<sup>th</sup>: 11<sup>mo</sup>: 1680-----

Sir I am exceedingly troubled and amazed in the co  
and pained and grate condensation in the many festation  
servent: being unworthy of the last glimps of your face  
should seme to crave pittty of me your on worthy  
all to gather an biert of pittty : as wited to a bove  
two letters since your departure: and I am glad  
and I pray god direct you in his way for your p  
whare you may be recompensed and rewarded fo  
for I am altogether on able to accomplish t  
reward for your labor and paines. I am yit limm  
capable of the same. And if you expect I sh  
and loud.: with love: mine is suche on gou  
cannot be commanded by you naither by my sol  
on profitable to both: wherfor I humbly I  
Sir under faver take one caution from your  
property of a wise man to labour and sow  
bennyfit: and indeed kind sir you  
naither will thay aford you that corr  
elsewhare in this my advice I ver
