 enlist our selves into the service of the
 united States of America to continue in
 that service for the term of three years
 unless sooner Regularly Discharged, we engage
 to be under the Command of the General officers
 of the United States of America which are or may
 be appointed and Faithfully to obey and observe
 all such orders as we from time to time shall receive
 from our officers and to be under such Regulations
 in every respect as are or may be provided for the arm
 of the United States. Dated this Twentieth day

Wee the Subscribers do hereby severally enlist ourselves into the service of the United States of America to Continue in that service for the term of three years unless sooner Regularly Discharged, wee engage to be under the Command of the general officers of the United States of America which are or may be appointed and Faithfully to obey and observe all such orders as wee from time to time shall receive from our officers and to be under such regulation in every respect as are or may be provided for the army of the United States. Dated this twentieth day of March A..D. 1781
