

#196 March 26, 1792

Letter from Joseph Dickinson to Lane Son & Fraser reporting fire on Lane property that destroyed dwellings

Respected Friends
Lane Son & Fraser

Beverly Park 3^d M^o 26th 1792

Charles Fisher the Tenant at Edstone was with me yesterday and informs me that by the carelessness of his Opposite Neighbour throwing some hot Ashes upon the Dunghill which set fire to the Straw and communicating with the Beast House Barn &c. they were soon reduced to a heap of ruins Four Cows a stirk & 7 pigs were destroyed and the Wind blowing hard from the South carried the Fire across the Street to Ch. Fishers House which was soon burnt to the Ground with the Stable and Out buildings by which misfortune he lost about 50 Quarters of Oats some Wheat and most of his Household Furniture and is now destitute of Harbour for himself and family but as he is beholden to a Neighbour a Widow Woman who was kind enough to leave her House and go to her son that he and his family might live there untill some convenience can be made for them again. Notwithstanding every possible exertion was made to preserve the buildings it was impossible, the Fire raged with such fury that the whole building (which were very bad) was consumed in about half an hour. This is a very unfortunate Accident but I believe not at allowing to any neglect of the Tenant as I am informed by a person of Credit who accompanied him hither.


